# **The Magic Touch**

The first thing you notice about Danny Knicely's musicianship is the effortlessness. He has the ability to make playing look arrestingly easy though your ears will tell you otherwise. Whether on mandolin, guitar or fiddle, Knicely lays down a groove and never lets up.



He comes by it honestly. Born to a deeply musical family in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia, Danny's father, Glen, plays bass and banjo. His mother, Darlena, sings "and she dances and plays a little of everything," he says.

Danny's grandfather, A.O. Knicely, continues to play play fiddle – at the age of 97.

The household was always full of musicians when Danny was growing up. "I played a lot with my parents friends," he recalls. They were great players, and they had good instruments. "That gets you inspired."

Danny's first instrument was bass. He played in the family band, *Heartland*, and sang baritone. They performed Carter family songs, country material and some gospel.

By the time he hit his teens, Danny started playing classic rock with some high school buddies, which led him inevitably to an interest in electric guitar. But he didn't own one. Danny lobbied his school to get one for the pep band.

I went to town and found a pearl-white Les Paul studio model and talked the school into buying it.

But traditional music never really receded to the background. After high school, Danny picked up the mandolin – and started experimenting with the fiddle. "Some people will tell you that's not the best idea," he says wryly.

Danny's natural talent was obvious. He jammed and networked at area festi-

vals, including Galax, and soon formed the group, *McGraw Gap*, with guitarist Larry Keel in 1995. They played local shows and won the band contest at the Telluride Bluegrass Festival that year. Knicely also won the mandolin contest and Keel grabbed the blue ribbon in guitar.



Everybody noticed.

The group recorded a CD and started touring as the warm-up band for *Leftover Salmon* on a string of western dates. For the next few years they played primarily rock and jam-grass venues and toured in China in 1998 and 1999 before disbanding in 2000.

Along about that time, Knicely starting performing with David Via and his group, *Corn Tornado*. Wonder where that name comes from? Swirl a mason jar half filled with moonshine and you've got your answer. (And don't forget to drink up.)

Still, the farthest reaches of the globe beckoned. "I got a bug for travel and world music," he says. That led to several trips to Nepal starting in 2004 and a keen interest in the indigenous music of that region. Thus was born the Mountain Music Project, an investigation of the striking similarities between Himalayan and Appalachian string styles.

"I met these guys that played the music and I really related to them," Knicely says. He wanted to record the local Nepalese players but needed money to do it. After some investigating, his partner in the project, Tara Linhardt, found there weren't any grant dollars available for audio recording. But there was for video. "So we decided to make a video about making a recording," Knicely explains.

The final project includes musical cameos by Tim

O'Brien, Mike Seeger, Sammy Shelor, Curtis Burch and fiddler Buddy Pendleton, among others. The video is well worth watching and can be purchased at Mountainmusicproject.com.

Knicely stays very busy these days working with a varied coterie of musicians including old-time player/ composer James Leva, David Via. manolinist Buddy Dunlap, Tim O'Brien, and Malian musician Cheick Hamala Diabate. Danny is part of the Virginia Folklife apprenticeship program mentoring younger players. He also continues to travel, and recently finished tours in France and Russia.

Danny just released a new album with Dunlap called Chop, Shred and Split. Next up, Knicely is working on a CD with guitarist Wyatt Rice and bassist Mark Schatz.
